## Peter's Second Sermon Acts 3:11-26

Acts 4:4 Philippians 2:12-18 Hebrews 12:1-2

#### **Memory Verse**

Shine as you hold out to them the Word of Life. Philippians 2:16 (NIrV)

#### Lesson Goals

Understand that our obedience to Christ can lead others to Him

Understand our role in Jesus' death

Understand that to follow Christ, means to turn away from sin



Have you ever watched a track meet and been mesmerized by a certain runner? They ran the race so well that you couldn't take your eyes off of them. You thought about their race afterwards and wanted to run like them. Let's see how Peter "runs the race" this week.

Who remembers what our last lesson was about? A lame man, a beggar. What happened to him? Peter and John healed him. What a miracle! Something else happened in the temple that day, and it happened because of the miracle. Let's see what it was!

After the lame man stood up and began walking and jumping and praising God through the temple area, he stayed close to John and Peter, even holding on to them. At this point, they were at Solomon's Porch, a part of the temple complex outside of the actual temple. The people were amazed! They ran to Peter and John and the man who had once been lame. "Why are you surprised?," Peter called out. "Why are you looking at us like we healed this man with our own power? God did this. He did it to glorify His Son, Jesus Christ." Peter continued, "But you killed Him. Pilate was going to let Him go, but you wouldn't let him. You spoke against Jesus, who had done nothing wrong, and you even asked for a murderer to go free instead." Peter said, "You killed the One who gives life, but God raised Him from the dead." (Acts 3:15 NIrV) "And it was faith in this same Jesus that made this lame man walk. All of you saw it happen!"

Peter told the people that he knew that they didn't really understand what they were doing when they had Jesus crucified. He encouraged them to turn away from their sins and to turn to God. "Then your sins will be wiped away. The time will come when the Lord will make everything new." (Acts 3:19b NIrV) Peter was telling the people that Jesus would come back one day. He will remain in Heaven until God is ready to make everything new. Those who trust in Jesus will be with Him forever in this new place.






#### Application

Whose example do you follow? As children, we learn to walk and talk from following the example of our parents or siblings.

The older we get, the more we emulate our friends and other adults we look up to. Have you surrounded yourself with good, wise, and godly friends? If not, will you commit to do that today? Jesus has left us an example. We should follow in His steps.

And if you have been wise enough to choose to surround yourself with good examples, are you following the example they are setting by being like Christ to you? Are you that example for someone else? Being that good example will open doors to share the good news of Jesus Christ with others. "Shine as you hold out to them the Word of Life." (Philippians 2:16 NIrV)

#### Review

- 3. Where were Peter and John when the crowd approached them? (At Solomon's Porch, inside the temple complex)
- 4. What did Peter tell the people? (Turn away from sin, turn to God, and your sins will be wiped away.)
- 5. How did the people respond? (Many believed.)

### **Preschool Lesson**

Peter and John had healed a lame man. The lame man stood up and began walking and jumping and praising God through the temple area. The people who had seen Peter heal the begging lame man heard an amazing message from him. They saw the miracle, and because of it, they listened to the message. Acts 4:4 (NIrV) tells us that, "many who heard the message believed. The number of men who believed grew to about 5,000."

## Activities

**Memory Verse Activity** - Print each of the words (and the reference) of the memory verse on separate pieces of paper. String a line across your meeting area and provide clothespins. Help your students hang the verse in order. Talk about what it means.

If you are not already visiting with your students, set a day and begin. Start with those who have come to Bible Study before but haven't been in a while. Continue with those around you who haven't visited yet.


Locate the temple on a map of Jerusalem. Locate Solomon's Porch and the Beautiful Gate on a diagram of the temple.




