Learning Activities

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- Memory Verse Activity Take a Memory Verse Walk. Print each word of the memory verse on separate sheets of construction paper. Use different colors for each word. Affix the construction paper to the floor far enough apart so that your students can comfortably step from one to the other. Sing or play music as your students walk from one word to the next. When the music stops, your students should stop as well. Have each one read their word, saying the entire verse in order. Continue until the verse has been memorized.
- Make pinch pots from clay. Attach the memory verse with string or ribbon.
- Sing "Change My Heart, O God," "Father, I Adore You," "Blessed Be the Lord, God Almighty," and "Behold, What Manner of Love."
- Read Isaiah 43:1-7 from several translations. If possible, make sure you include The Amplified Bible and The Message.
- **Dig Deeper:** Read Matthew 6:25-34. Read again and count the number of times we are told not to worry. Discuss the reasons given for not worrying. Is there any room for worry in the life of a child of God?
- **Dig Deeper Still:** Bring a lump of clay and a finished piece of pottery. Talk about the process of turning a lump of clay into something beautiful and lasting. Read the following for discussion; Isaiah 64:8, Isaiah 45:9, Isaiah 29:16, Jeremiah 18:1-6, and Romans 9:20-21.
