Lesson Goal: To encourage students to have the attitude of Christ.

Scriptures: Philippians 2:3-5

For Memory: "Have this attitude in yourselves, which was also in Christ Jesus."

Philippians 2:5

Think Like Jesus

In our last lesson, we said that we should be united together for a purpose. The Apostle Paul had something specifically in mind. He encouraged us to be together, united, to love one another, to minister to one another, to help each other to be people who live like Jesus lived.

First, Paul points out a serious problem. Many people do things that may be good, but are done for the wrong reasons. He says that we should not do anything that calls attention to us. Don't do anything that makes us look good, just because we want others to brag on us.* He says that we should always think of other people as being better than us.

Actually, the Apostle is saying again here what he said in verses one and two of this chapter. He said the same thing, but in different ways. Think about it, he said, "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit..." - You ought not to put yourself out in front—that's humility.

- "...but in humility consider others better than ourselves." Put yourself and your welfare behind that of other people—that's humility.
- "...look not only to your own interests..." Your stuff is not more important than other people's stuff—that's humility
- "...(look) to the interests of others." Make good things for others more important than good things for you—that's humility.

So, Paul had just defined humility for the Philippians and his words do that for us today. He was moving toward a specific goal. He had heard that there were arguments and disunity among the people in Philippi. He was not willing to say, "Just get it together." He gave them a step by step map for unity. And, he had said in verse one, base your unity on your relationship with Christ and His Holy Spirit. In the second verse, he said that they should think together. With fellowship based on Jesus, and putting their minds together, they were to humbly move together to one purpose.

And now, what was that purpose? It is stated in our memory verse for today. <u>Paul wanted his dear friends in Philippi to *think like Jesus*. He was not talking only about thinking. When we think, our thoughts are processed through our attitudes. In the New International translation of Scripture, the word is actually translated *attitude*.</u>

Jesus' attitude was just like what Paul had described. <u>Jesus did not think of Himself. He came to earth thinking of us.</u> He lived and died, thinking of us. He taught His disciples, thinking of them. He rose from the grave, thinking of us. He ascended back into Heaven where, the Bible says, He is currently sitting on the right side of God and talking to God *on our behalf*.

What the Apostle was telling the Philippians and is telling us: Not only are we to act like Jesus, we are to think like Jesus, and that means that we are to have the same internal feelings as Jesus. Jesus wasn't a bad person in any way. He was perfect. Even so, He allowed humans to capture Him, put Him through an unlawful trial, convict Him of a crime He didn't do, and put Him to death in the worst way. If that happened in our day, He would be strapped to a gurney and have drugs injected into His body until He died. Jesus regarded us more important than Himself, even though He was much better than any of us could ever be.

How was Paul expecting the Philippians to think and behave? Just exactly like Jesus would. He put others first, we should do the same thing. That's thinking like Jesus. Jesus was the most humble man who ever lived. We should try being like that!

In our next lesson, we will learn much more about how Jesus thought and behaved.

Teaching Tips:
